Augmentative & Alternative Communication (AAC)

- Examples of AAC: Text To Speech, Eye Gaze Systems, Sign Language, Communication Boards, etc.
- Using memes as AAC primarily focuses on communication boards found on digital devices as well as typical interactive activities (social media posts, chat, etc).



Memes!

- A meme is an activity, concept, catchphrase, or piece of media that spreads, often as mimicry or for humorous purposes, from person to person via the Internet.
- Usually takes the form of an image, GIF or video.



Memes, a brief history of the term

- First published case of the word meme dates back to Richard Dawkins' 1976 book, The Selfish Gene. Dawkins referred to it as a "Mimeme"—a word derived from Greek that means "that which is imitated." The word was then abbreviated to just "meme" due to its similarity to the word "gene."
- In 2013, Dawkins characterized an Internet meme as being a meme deliberately altered by human creativity distinguished from biological genes and his own pre-Internet concept of a meme, which involved mutation by random change and spreading through accurate replication as in Darwinian selection.


How can memes be used as AAC?

- Memes are ubiquitous, and used worldwide. Even if the text isn't understood, the image itself will.
- Memes are 'free' to use and anyone can make one
- Memes draw from multiple sources and genres of popular culture; not perceived as an obvious form of AAC
- Built-in adaptability in relation to slang, culture and current events















Making your own memes

- Easiest way is to use a site that has templates:
 - imgflip.com/memegenerator
 - memegenerator.net/create
- Alternatively, using a still image and adding an inimage caption also works (typically using Impactstyle font, but this is a guideline, not a rule)
